"I've met so many cool people I wouldn't have met otherwise doing this and gained so much experience." During the early stages, Dan Fehr helped his sister with creating an amazing musical scene. "Any time you don't know something just ask the people that do know," Fehr stated when discussing her brother's advice. For the remainder of the time, she will be in different villages for weeks at a time "forming relationships and teaching them about Jesus."


There is a fairly large expense to be able to travel and take part in these mission trips. The price for Osborne's mission trip this upcoming summer is \$5,500, which "doesn't include domestic flights, visas, or baggage fees." All together, the trip will cost roughly \$6,000. To raise money, Osborne has been selling sweatshirts that say "driven by love." for \$30 each. From sweatshirt sales alone, Osborne has made roughly \$1,300. In addition to this, Osborne has sent out prayer letters and support letters. Through these various

methods of raising money for her trip, Osborne is about 90% funded. "Thank you to everyone who's bought a sweatshirt and for all of the support."

Competing at this meet qualified him for state. In order to make state for diving, you must compete in two six dive meets and one eleven dive meet,

and you have to perform two dives per category. Myers says that his favorite dive is "probably a back one and a half because adrenaline rushes through when doing it."

Myers said he wants to go to state and dive clean. He says some of his dives aren't as hard as some of the others he is competing with, but his goal is to make all-state which is top four. Myers says he has enjoyed this season and is "super excited to see where next year goes."

"Here's Looking at You Kid": Casablanca Review

Casablanca is a 1942 romantic film directed by cinema pioneer, Michael Curtiz. This is the standout piece amongst an aweinspiring lineup of classic movies including, Mildred Pierce (1945), The Adventures of Robin Hood (1938), and White Christmas (1954), helmed by Curtiz as he invigorated Hollywood with a sense of realism not yet seen. Since

its release 78 years ago, the film has been praised as one of the greatest pieces of cinema ever created. The film also stars Humphrey Bogart, most known for his work in detective noir films, and Ingrid Bergman, one of the biggest names in Hollywood at the time.

Set in French, and consequently Nazi, occupied Casablanca in the early stages of the Second World War, the film follows American nightclub owner Rick Blaine (Humphrey Bogart) as he reconnects with his old flame Ilsa (Ingrid Bergman), However, he soon discovers she is there with her husband Victor Laszlo (Paul Henreid), the leader of a resistance spanning all of Europe, as they are trying to escape to America. Ilsa and Rick were together in the weeks prior to Nazi occupation of

Paris, and when they were about to storm the city, she abandoned him. He felt betrayed but still had feelings, and the majority of the film is him discovering the proper path to take and whether it is the right thing to do.

For a movie that came out in 1942, it feels surprisingly modern. The filmmaking techniques and writing make the film feel way ahead of its time. The time period that this came out in saw very direct and literal screenplays with little nuance and genuine emotion. Those films are still classics, but the dialogue takes away from the experience quite a bit. However, Casablanca does not fall under this category. The dialogue feels very natural and full of iconic lines, such as the classic "Here's looking at you kid." Rick and Ilsa feel like real people going through a real situation with the way they react to their surroundings. There are also a handful of surprisingly funny jokes that catch you off guard if you are expecting a dry experience.

Also, the set design and cinematography combine for a very distinct feel for the movie. The status quo of films from this era was flat lighting and backgrounds and basic camera angles. However, cinematographer Arthur Edeson worked with Curtiz to give their film meaningful camera angles/movements and gripping set design that places you into the middle of 1940's Casablanca.

Overall, this film is one of the greatest pieces of cinema ever released, and deserves all the recognition it receives. I would give Casablanca a 10/10.

Dangerous Jump

In recent years, the indoor trampoline park Just Jump opened up in Bristol and has become a staple attraction at the Pinnacle. The park, which claims to be a prime location for "family fun, birthday parties, corporate team building & social outings for all ages", is only one of many trampoline parks currently operating in the United States. However, according to WREG, the number of accidents reported from trampoline parks in Tennessee are rising. Though the severity of these reports were not disclosed, it's important to note that it's mandatory for any trampoline park company to file a report of any customer admitted into a medical facility. It's stated on the official Just Jump website that only .02% of injuries occurring in the U.S happen on trampolines and safety "is [their] main concern", but that doesn't prevent all the many possible injuries and mishaps occurring in the park. Despite the extensive list of rules named on Just Jump's website, including (but not limited to) no horseplay, no double flips, no running, and no group acrobatics, there are still many injuries coming out of the park. The main type of injuries resulting from the park are burns and bruises, and are easily treatable but some injuries are even more severe and are worth accounting for. Personally, I believe it's significant to remember anyone can put themselves in danger in any situation. On the Just Jump website it states, "There is a risk of injury in anything you do, from waking up in the morning and rolling out of bed, to driving your car to work", which approves the notion that even under circumstances where getting hurt doesn't even seem likely, it can still happen. However, it's always important to be precautionary. This especially applies to places like Just Jump, where many factors can play into an injury. Factors such as the amount of people jumping at a time, the age of the jumpers, and the amount of staff working that day play a significant role. However, the jumper themselves are responsible for their wellbeing and expected to know the rules

and regulations of the park. If the jumper is younger, their guardian is accountable for their safety just as much as Just Jump. Participants need to be wary of themselves and those around them to ensure safety, and to prevent any injuries that may occur. Though there is a risk of getting hurt, it shouldn't stop those wanting to jump. As long as all of the rules are being followed and all jumpers participate within their comfort zone, all measures of safety are being met. As the site said, anyone can get hurt from even the most mundane tasks, so if you are going to jump, jump wisely.

Battle of the Breadsticks


Secondly, there is the appearance itself. Olive Garden breadsticks appear very firm. When you grab an Olive Garden breadstick, they just stay completely as is. A Fazoli's breadstick, however, may bend or even break in half. Olive Garden's breadsticks, admittedly, do have a more put together appearance. On an Olive Garden breadstick, you can see the seasoning shining like glitter. Olive Garden breadsticks aren't perfect, but they are more pristine than Fazoli's. Fazoli's breadsticks can have many creases and imperfections. However, as the icon Hannah Montana once said, "Nobody's perfect."

Thirdly, there is cost. Both restaurants offer breadsticks options for carry out, which sadly are obviously not unlimited. Half a dozen breadsticks at Fazoli's are \$2.69, and half a dozen breadsticks are \$3.79 at Olive Garden. A dozen breadsticks at Fazoli's are \$4.39, while a dozen are \$5.29 at Olive Garden. Overall, I would say that Fazoli's are the better deal.

Lastly, and most importantly, there is the taste of the breadstick. Surprisingly enough, they both taste like breadsticks. Olive Garden breadsticks have more flavor, but sometimes less is more. Fazoli's breadsticks are a simple wonder. While they are somewhat soggy, Fazoli's breadsticks have a garlicy

flavor that balance well with salads. Olive Garden breadsticks are more filling, and rather salty. Teeth sink softly into a Fazoli's breadstick, while sometimes Olive Garden breadsticks require more effort to eat.



many are nervous about what to sign up for. I'd say I have an adequate grasp of classes at THS and here are my top recommendations.




Best Valentine's Day Candy?


